The Sexual Abuse Assessment and Treatment (SAAT) program offers comprehensive assessment and specialized intervention and treatment to children and youth who have been sexually victimized, or who are exhibiting concerning sexualized behaviours. This support is provided to young people as well as their non-offending parents/caregivers and families

0ASIS

The Outreach, Assessment and Specialized Intensive Services (OASIS) program is Hamilton's only mental health trauma treatment program offering specialized services to immigrant and refugee children, youth, and their families who have experienced trauma in another country, while on their journey to Canada, or while in Canada.

PSYCHO-EDUCATIONAL GROUPS FOR PARENTS AND CAREGIVERS

Our online parent groups are now available online and available for families for free!

- Courage to Tell is designed for parents/caregivers who are dealing with a recent disclosure of sexual abuse involving their child/youth. This two-part course equips with important knowledge about such areas as how to support their child/youth
 - during this emotional and challenging time, how to respond to different questions and/or behaviours, how to navigate their way through the process of dealing with their child's/youth's disclosure of sexual abuse, etc.
- ABC's of CSB (Concerning Sexualized Behaviours) is a two-part online educational course for parents/caregivers of children (ages 11 and under) with concerning
 - sexualized behaviours. Participants will benefit from having the opportunity to increase their knowledge about child sexual development and how to support and respond to a child who is exhibiting concerning sexualized behaviours.

HIGH SCHOOL DROP-IN MENTAL HEALTH SUP-PORT FOR NEWCOMERS

For over 5 years the OASIS program has been providing a drop-in mental health support for newcomer youth at the recently closed Sir John A MacDonald. Providing as an early intervention, youth are able to connect immediately to a mental health clinician who can support them through some of life's daily challenges. For those who require more intensive trauma treatment, a referral is made to the OASIS program.

Through a paid partnership with Hamilton Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) and Hamilton Wentworth Catholic District School Board (HWCDSB), this program is now available in 5 schools locally. We have supported over 100 students this year and made over 20 referrals to partnering agencies.

Hamilton Health Team

In late November, the Ontario government announced Hamilton as one of the first communities in Ontario to move forward with establishing an Ontario Health Team. The Hamilton Health Team is a collaboration of Hamilton's health and social service partners and includes representation from more than 20 organizations, reflecting primary care, home care, hospitals, community agencies, long-term care, mental health, Indigenous health, post-secondary education, and the City of Hamilton (Healthy and Safe Communities Department, Public Health and Paramedic Services), among others.


Thrive is pleased to be part of Ontario's commitment to end hallway health care and build a connected and sustainable health care system centred around the needs of patients.

We Commit to Action on Anti-Black Racism





At Thrive, we share in the collective outrage and sadness at the violent incidents of anti-Black racism that have occurred in the last few months. We acknowledge that these events are only the most recent manifestations of systemic anti-Black racism that has existed for generations, having devastating impact and persistently traumatizing Black communities. We each have the responsibility to be active allies in making the changes required to create a just and equitable society.

We know that Black, Brown and Indigenous people are disproportionately represented within our service system and are more likely to be marginalized, including the negative impact that marginalization has on individual's health, well-being, hope, and resilience. We are deeply motivated to make meaningful change and work with young people and their families who use our services,. In addition, we look for opportunities to further dismantle racism with our staff, and our communities.

We recognize the need to do so in a way that is respectful, ethical, and equitable being especially mindful of those members of the Black community (as well as the Indigenous and People of Colour) who have historically been disenfranchised.

We commit to continued conversations, and ongoing educational opportunities for all staff, management and boards of directors with regards to Anti-Black racism. We are committed to holding ourselves at an increased level of accountability, and continue to work at reviewing and revising our programs, as well as our policies and procedures to best align with the values and best practices of anti-racism and anti-oppression. We are committed to raising awareness surrounding Anti-Black racism and the Black Lives Matter movement at an external level.






